What is En Primeur?

Put simply En Primeur refers to buying wine before it has shipped from the producer. Sometimes referred to as 'wine futures,' buying En Primeur has many advantages, including securing the wine at original release price, being able to choose what formats you wish to have your wine bottled in, and guaranteeing provenance.

Wines offered En Primeur typically sell out quickly, as enthusiastic buyers scramble to buy the latest releases. The thrill of the chase, the deep satisfaction in knowing you've secured something rare at opening price, and the eager anticipation of those cases eventually being delivered; it's all part of it.

En Primeur traditionally referred to Bordeaux and Burgundy, but has since expanded to cover regions such as Italy (Piemonte and Tuscany), Germany, the Rhône, and some of the New World.

Who is En Primeur for?

En Primeur is for everyone! Whether you are new to fine wine collecting and looking to start a cellar, or a seasoned pro, buying wines on release and directly from the winery has tangible benefits to anyone who wishes to collect or drink the very best wines of the world. Even if you don't wish to cellar your wines with us and would rather take immediate delivery upon arrival, or you simply want some nice cases of wine to drink in the future, securing on release, direct from source, is clearly the smart way to buy.

Where estates produce small volumes, buying En Primeur allows access to stock that otherwise never hits the shelves. And where producers offer the option to bottle in various formats, buying En Primeur allows you to dictate your preferred bottling sizes, from half bottles and magnums all the way up to 27-litre Primats! Buying En Primeur is often the best time to purchase, with opening pricing typically being cheaper than secondary market once the wine becomes physical.

Provenance comes first

Purchasing En Primeur ensures that you are buying your fine wine direct from source, thus guaranteeing provenance. In a world where hundreds of cases of fine wine are traded on global markets daily, buying En Primeur gives you total peace of mind that your wine has perfect provenance and hasn't gone through an intermediary. Shipping directly from the cellars to us, buying En Primeur is a process which you can fully trace and trust.

Where is the best place to store my wine?

We offer state-of-the-art professional wine storage. Our facility at Eton Park is temperature and humidity controlled, free from natural light or vibration, and secure with single entry access. Using our facility not only ensures that your wine is kept in the best possible condition until it is ready to drink, but also allows you to monitor and track the performance of your cellar over time using our online Personal Cellar tool, giving you ultimate control over your purchasing.

When do I receive the wine?

You legally own the wine as soon as you order and pay for it, however En Primeur wines tend to have a longer delivery time depending on the region from where they're shipping, so won't be delivered immediately. 2023 Burgundy Whites will be shipped Summer 2025, with the Reds shipping in time for Christmas 2025. When buying En Primeur all paperwork is raised under bond, excluding duty and VAT.

By default your order will transfer to our secure storage facility (Eton Park) upon arrival. If you would like to have your wine delivered to a home address upon arrival please let us know when ordering. One of our team will be in touch with you once the wine becomes physical to arrange delivery, at which point duty and VAT is payable.

Your wines are fully insured from the moment you place and pay for your order, whether held abroad in the producer's cellars or in transit to our facility, offering complete peace of mind.

Côte de Beaune

The Côte de Beaune makes up the southern portion of the Côte d'Or, the heart of Burgundy. It runs from the village of Ladoix, just to the north of Beaune, down to Santenay 20km to the south. The reds can be excellent from here and tend to have more perfume and less weight than those from further north in the Côte, but it is for whites that this region is most famous. From the structured and long lived Corton–Charlemagne to the decadent weight of Bâtard-Montrachet, these are the finest Chardonnays in the world.

Côte de Nuits

The Northern part of the Côte d'Or, this is predominantly Pinot Noir country, although a relatively few classy whites are made. Named after the main town of Nuits-Saint-Georges, whose wines tend towards sturdiness and longevity, the quality arguably reaches its apogee in Vosne Romanée, where the finest Grand Crus are located. Those seeking elegance and perfume would be best served heading to Chambolle-Musigny, whilst for raw power, Gevrey-Chambertin is king.

Chablis

Great Chablis has an extraordinary blend of power masked by a nervy minerality and is a truly unique style. Nowhere else manages to make Chardonnay of such austerity, yet also generosity and age worthiness. No serious cellar is complete without it.

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VINTAGE REPORT

“One plus one equals two. It keeps the world spinning. But artists, musicians, con men, poets, mystics and such are paid to turn that math on its head ... When the world is at its best, when we are at our best, when life feels fullest, one and one equals three.”

Having tasted around Burgundy this autumn, the only clarity gained is that $1 + 1 = 3$. 2023 is a beautiful, confusing surprise – the vintage should follow the line of hotter vintages, but frequently, this is not the case.

2023 broke the record set in 2022 for the hottest average temperature, with an increase of 0.2°C . Despite this headline, 2023 wasn't consistently hot and sunny; the levels of rainfall were average and in line with much cooler years such as 2002 and 2010. By contrast, 2022 was like years characterised as hot and dry, such as 2020 and 2015. Perhaps the key to 2023 lies in its hours of sunshine, where it sits in 9th place overall and comfortably behind recent vintages

like 2022 and 2018. We have a vintage that would appear to produce hot wines based on temperature but has produced wines with a succulent, vivid fruit character reminiscent of colder, racier years like 2017. The best wines have a brightly mellow character; they capture biting into fruit at the perfect point of maturity that retains its crunch and texture.

The winter of 2023 was generally warm and dry, with sunshine hours below the average. Mercifully, bud break was delayed, and when frost arrived at the end of March, it had little impact. April and May were sunny but relatively chilly, and flowering commenced at the end of May and finished in June under superb

conditions. The stage was set for a substantial potential crop, with giant bunches capable of producing yields not seen since 1982. Quality-conscious domaines had to reduce their yields by up to 50% to reach ideal yields of 35-45 hl/ha. As ever, the devil is in the detail, and domaines relied on different methods: historical pruning that restricts yields year-on-year, pruning in the vintage, de-budding, and single or multiple green harvests to reduce bunches.

June had approximately 20% more hours of sunshine than average, but the temperature was only fractionally above the average. July and August were both cloudier and rainier than average. The first ten days of September were sweltering, helping to bring grapes to maturity and adding concentration but also bringing the potential for over-maturity. The picking window

was wide in 2023. Many producers in the Côte de Beaune picked during the first week of September, and a few producers in the Côte de Nuits joined them, but the majority picked from 7th to 12th September. The high temperatures restricted many domaines to picking only in the morning.

With grapes safely in the winery, vigneron were excited about the size and potential quality of the vintage. 2023 is a vintage where sorting was crucial in both the vineyard and the winery, and the generous yields enabled domaines to select only the best fruit. Early fears about dilution were largely unrealised, and producers did what was necessary to bring in ideal crops. The 2022 vintage was comparatively a walk in the park, producing grapes of uniform ripeness and quality. 2023 is

not so uniform, and the variability has created more tension and verve in the wines than was often found in the more polished and seductive 2022 vintage. The acidity in 2023 is not high but is generally a touch higher than in 2022 and certainly feels livelier in the glass. The pH level in 2023 is usually lower than in 2022, giving the perception of fresher acidity. The use of whole bunches in red wine vinification has become a hot topic in recent years, and one consequence of the abundance of grapes in 2023 is that many producers were obliged to reduce their percentages of whole bunches to accommodate the larger harvests in their fermenters.

The white wines of the Côte de Beaune are generally more consistent in style than the red wines of the Côte de Nuits, and the best wines are a triumph and destined to sit alongside the

finest modern vintages. Chardonnay adapts well to higher yields and delivered beautifully balanced wines when yields were restricted to 40-55 hl/ha. These are modern wines in their levels of ripeness yet with a freshness and energy that is already so moreish. The brightly mellow character is expressed in wines that have full maturity but also vivacity and tension. The fruit characters are typically in the orchard and stone fruit spectrum but seldom stretch into tropical fruits. Alcohol levels are refreshingly moderate across the board. Regional and village wines will be ready to drink upon delivery, but the top Premier and Grand Crus deserve the opportunity to be served alongside the best vintages with time in the cellar.

The 2023 vintage in Chablis highlights the risks of modern viticulture and fortunately the

region narrowly escaped spring frosts. The temperature dropped as low as -6C on multiple nights in early April, but fortunately, there was no significant damage because the budburst was later than average. 2023 continues the trend of sunnier styles of Chablis, but not at the expense of terroir, and there is plenty of freshness and oyster shell minerality. The cooler climate Left Bank Premier Crus continue to overperform in these vintages, and the savvy buyer should snap these up. The Grand Crus of Chablis remain relative bargains in the global context of fine Chardonnay.

The red wines from the Côte de Nuits are more variable in general than those from 2022, but the peaks of quality have the potential to be even higher and many wines have more pinosity than their 2022 counterparts. The fruit characters are in the red and blue spectrum,

rarely straying into black fruit territory. Tannins are moderate and should be silky; it was a mistake to over-extract in 2023. Pinot is fragile, and that fragility is also its strength; the balance could quickly be shattered in 2023 with a heavy-handed approach. 2023 is another beautifully transparent vintage for expression of terroir, and it would have been a shame to shroud it. Generous yields have shaped the wines into a joyous, effortless package. It would be easy to underestimate the top Premier and Grand Crus, such is their precociousness today. Many producers speculated that consumers could drink 2023 before 2022, but they retain a deceptive capacity for ageing.

I am not much further along the path of understanding the 2023 vintage other than the adage that $1 + 1 = 3$. In 2023, the vintage is a tool, and the star is the terroir. The wines should

show the season's heat, but they taste airy, vivid, and fresh. We live in an era of Burgundy where these vintages have precious few comparisons; growers haven't experienced these conditions before. The joys of the successful 2023s are the fruit character of a cooler year with maturity of a fully ripe year. Some wines will be drunk early and certainly at regional and village levels. The best Premier and Grand Crus will enjoy a long and fruitful evolution. The white wines have a very appealing orchard and stone fruit character, reinforced by phenolic ripeness and a Goldilocks acidity that makes the wines seem fresher than one might think. These are not austere wines with citrus fruits and cold stones; they are generous in yield and temperament. The red wines are emotional wines, capturing the fragility and resilience of Pinot Noir in equal measures. The best growers shrugged off the

demands of the vintage and declared it to be an uneventful season, and they also appear to have done the least in the cellar. This is not a vintage for man-made architecture and extraction; winemakers needed to tend the vines throughout the season, pick at the right time, and adopt a largely hands-off approach in the winery once sorting had been completed. The best 2023s have a remarkable fluidity and vitality that is compelling.

Selecting favourites can be a challenging task, yet if we were compelled to choose, the following vineyards would undoubtedly be first in line.

IN THE VINES

La Pièce Sous Le Bois

Blagny is a hamlet located between the communes of Puligny-Montrachet and Meursault. White wines from the area are labelled as Puligny-Montrachet or Meursault, but the Blagny appellation was introduced in 1937 for red wines. La Pièce Sous Le Bois is at the limit of vine cultivation, and the land above is forest. The name translates as 'the piece under the wood'. These sites are becoming increasingly prized in warmer vintages, and Matrot produces a particularly refined and mineral expression of the terroir from a 2.5-hectare plot.

Our choice: 2023 Blagny Rouge, 1er Cru La Pièce Sous Le Bois, Domaine Matrot (p 23)

Le Prieuré

Bourgogne Hautes Côtes de Nuits is the appellation for wines produced from vineyards on the Hautes-Côtes (high slopes) of the Côte de Nuits. Historically, the higher altitude here meant that grapes could struggle to ripen every vintage, but this freshness is increasingly prized in warmer vintages. Aurélien Verdet's Le Prieuré vineyard is a 4.5-hectare south-facing slope above Nuits-Saint-Georges that has been certified organic since 1971.

Our choice: 2023 Bourgogne Hautes-Côtes de Nuits, Le Prieuré, Domaine Aurélien Verdet (p 65)

Grèves

Grèves is a relatively large Premier Cru with 31 hectares planted to vines, but the best part is the central section made famous by Bouchard's Vigne d'Enfant Jésus. Nicolas Potel owns a tiny 0.2313-hectare plot next to the Vigne d'Enfant Jésus planted in 1904. These are believed to be the oldest vines in Grèves, and Nicolas uses them for much of his massale selection for vineyard replanting.

Our choice: 2023 Beaune, 1er Cru, Grèves, Domaine de Bellene (p 55)

Carougeot

Gevrey-Chambertin is home to many of the most famous Grand Cru and Premier Cru vineyards vineyards in the Côte d'Or, but many of its village lieu-dit vineyards remain under the radar. Carougeot is located at the corner of Premier Cru La Perrière, not far from Grand Cru Mazis Chambertin. It produces structured wines that punch above their weight and can push Premier Cru levels of quality.

Our choice: 2023 Gevrey-Chambertin, Carougeot, Domaine Antonin Guyon (p 40)



Clos La Riotte

This walled vineyard is owned collectively by the village of Morey and is leased to Odoul-Coquard because they have the fewest Premier Cru vineyards in the village. Sébastien Odoul makes the wine and gives a proportion back to Morey for use at their parties and events. We want to go to a party in the village if they're serving Clos La Riotte!

Our choice: 2023 Morey-St.-Denis, 1er Cru Clos La Riotte, Domaine Odoul-Coquard (p 68)

Sous Frétille

Sous Frétille is tucked away behind the hill of Corton, overlooking the wooded side of the hill. The name means 'below the small forest', an oasis of Chardonnay on white marl soil, surrounded by Pinot Noir. The vineyard was awarded Premier Cru status in 2001. Located a stone's throw from the En Charlemagne section of Grand Cru Corton-Charlemagne, Sous Frétille shares many of the same characteristics.

Our choice: 2023 Pernand-Vergelesses, 1er Cru Sous Frétille, Domaine Antonin Guyon (p 39)

La Fussière

La Fussière is a picturesque Premier Cru vineyard situated at the southernmost tip of the Côte d'Or, within the Maranges appellation. Stretching nearly 42 hectares, it is the largest Premier Cru in the area. Predominantly planted to Pinot Noir, with a small portion of Chardonnay, La Fussière benefits from its rare, directly south-facing exposure, which provides exceptional sunlight and promotes excellent ripening.

Our choice: 2023 Maranges 1er Cru La Fussière, Domaine Bachelet-Monnot (p 45)

La Perrière

Henri Gouges discovered the Pinot Blanc mutation of Pinot Noir in his beloved Premier Cru Clos des Porrets Saint-Georges in 1936. He used cuttings to create a nursery that became the base from which he expanded the domaine's holdings of what has become known as Pinot Gouges. La Perrière is an 80-year-old 0.41-hectare plot located high on the slope in the heart of the Premier Cru in what was formerly a quarry. A unique wine of power, minerality, and complexity.

Our choice: 2023 Nuits-St.-Georges Blanc, 1er Cru La Perrière, Domaine Henri Gouges (p 82)

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Petit Chablis

Petit Chablis covers an area of 729 hectares, so it may seem like an odd selection here. However, Samuel owns a specific single vineyard directly above Grand Cru Les Clos. The oldest vines here date back to 1976, which is out-of-category for Petit Chablis. Samuel calls the wine 'Sur Les Clos' but it is not included on the label, making this a very confidential tip!

Our choice: 2023 Petit Chablis, Domaine Samuel Billaud (p 98)

Clos des Hospices

The Clos des Hospices is located towards the bottom of Grand Cru Les Clos and is owned exclusively by the Moreau family. Louis' great-great-grandfather acquired the vineyard from the Hôpital de Chablis in 1904. There is less chalk and more clay in this part of Les Clos, and the wine is correspondingly fuller and richer in style. Clos des Hospices is a fantastic contrast to the main Les Clos bottling and highlights the diversity of terroir in the most famous Chablis Grand Cru.

Our choice: 2023 Chablis, Grand Cru, Clos des Hospices dans les Clos, Domaine Louis Moreau (p 95)

A LOVE LETTER TO BURGUNDY

Working in the wine trade, one is often asked the question by those with a more casual relationship with grapes: "So, what is your favourite wine region?". My reply is quick and never wavers. "Simple. The region that changed and shaped my life. Burgundy".

It was March 2004. As a fresh faced 18-year-old (temporary) university dropout, I was, unknowingly, about to embark on a vinous voyage that would not only go on to define my love of this hallowed wine region, but also change my life forever.

I arrived at the Holbeck Ghyll Country House Hotel, then one of the finest small luxury hotels in the Lake District, eager to learn about restaurants and fine dining. Nine months later, I left as a Junior Sommelier with a passion for the finest Burgundy,

having been paid to navigate one of the most underrated Côte d'Or-focused wine lists in the country at the time.

It was not all plain sailing; Burgundy is a complex mistress after all. On one of my first days, I distinctly remember serving a discerning couple who pointed to and ordered a bottle of 1999 Domaine Roulot, Meursault Les Meix Chavaux. Lacking in knowledge and decent French, I butchered the pronunciation of "Roulot", "Meursault" and "Les Meix Chavaux"! They obviously saw something in my youthful ignorance, as they gave me a glass to taste. I can still remember the clarity, definition, energy, concentration and length of that wine. It was like nothing I had tasted before, all citrus peel, pear and white flowers, wrapped around

tongue-tingling minerality. Obviously, at the time, I could not describe these sensations, but what I did know was that this was the region for me, and I wanted more!

When not running the gauntlet of a Michelin starred service, I would be found with a copy of The World Atlas of Wine by my side. From there, I began to decipher the difference between Chablis and Chassagne, Gevery and Givry, Montrachet and Mâcon, Volnay and Vosne. I was helped on this journey of study by having access to such producers as Domaine Raveneau, Coche-Dury, Roumier, Rousseau, Denis Mortet, Lamy and many more. I must add, all of which were much more affordable to the mere mortal back then!

Fast forward twenty years, I now find myself a veteran of over 15 years in the wine trade, many of those having been spent working for some of the most recognisable names in the world of wine. This industry has not only offered me a job which I am passionate about, it has given me the opportunity to visit and explore, on numerous occasions, the region which defines my love of wine and for which everything else is compared to: Burgundy.

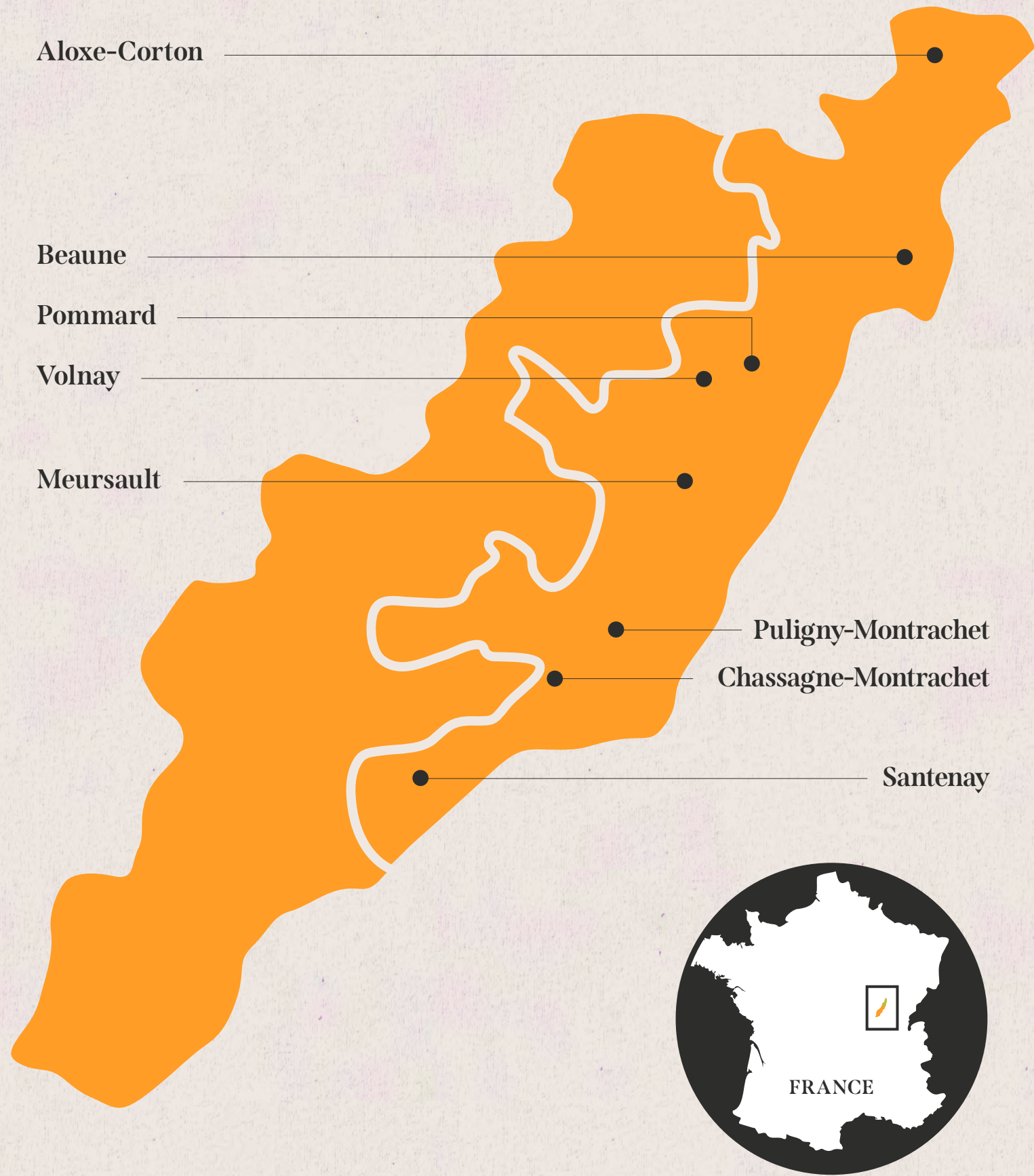
But what is it that makes Burgundy so romantic and special to me, and many others around the

world? Is it the wines themselves? The terroir? The winemakers? The history and heritage? The beautiful surroundings? Or the people you drink it with? Once again, the answer is simple. It is all of the above. Great wine is best shared in great company and with those who appreciate what you are consuming. I have been fortunate enough to drink some of the finest, most memorable and valuable bottles of wine with people who I am lucky to call my friends. I have visited cellars with them, tasted with winemakers and walked through extraordinary vineyards. Burgundy brings you closer together through shared experiences, whether that is the monumental highs of sipping perfect bottles of 2002 Corton-Charlemagne from Domaine Coche-Dury, 1990 Rousseau Chambertin and 2004 Montrachet from Ramonet, or encountering the earth-shattering disappointment of opening a faulty bottle of 1992 Domaine Leflaive Bâtard or a corked magnum of 2009 Dujac Clos Saint-Denis. Whatever the highs or lows, Burgundy is a region that you will never forget. It is both a constant and yet leaves you wanting more, it becomes part of the wine lover that you are.

Cheers to discovery. Cheers to vinous pleasure at whatever the cost. Cheers to Burgundy.

DOMAINE MATROT

Sisters Elsa and Adèle are the sixth generation of winemakers at Domaine Matrot, taking over from their father, Thierry, in 2016. The winemaking is classic, with no new oak used apart from the Bourgogne Blanc. The sisters have introduced more extended ageing in barrel, with 15 months for villages and 18 months for Premier Cru now standard. 2023 was the longest ever harvest at Matrot, partly because of the volumes and also because they only picked during the mornings when temperatures were cooler.

2023 Bourgogne Chardonnay, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2025-2029

Case 6 £110.00

A regional blend from Meursault, Maranges, and Hautes Côtes de Beaune, this Bourgogne sees about 30% new oak, which later finds its way to the domaine's Premier Crus. Bottled in August, just ahead of harvest, this 2023 Bourgogne Blanc is expressive and engaging, with juicy stone fruit, a touch of patisserie, and a refreshing saline snap on the finish. Remarkably accomplished for its category.

2023 Meursault Villages, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2027-2036

Case 6 £275.00

Matrot's five hectares of Meursault, spread across 12 different plots, come together in this finely crafted blend. Fresh citrus and stone fruits lead the nose, with added notes of walnut and a hint of flint. The palate strikes a balance between the classic texture of Meursault and a focused mineral line that keeps it fresh and lifted on the finish – a deftly composed Villages that captures the spirit of Meursault.

2023 Meursault Chevalières, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2027-2036

Case 6 £315

Matrot's 5 hectares of Meursault, spread across 12 different plots, come together in this finely crafted blend. Fresh citrus and stone fruits lead the nose, with added notes of walnut and a hint of flint. The palate strikes a balance between the classic texture of Meursault and a focused mineral line that keeps it fresh and lifted on the finish – a deftly composed Villages that captures the spirit of Meursault.

2023 Meursault, 1er Cru Les Charmes, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2028-2040

Case 6 £475.00

Matrot own nearly one hectare of Charmes split across four parcels, one was sold off in bulk this year because it didn't fit the house style. The majority of the blend comes from the cooler Charmes Dessus section near 1er Cru Perrières. Orchard fruits and minerals lead the nose and carry onto the palate, which combines a creamy texture with taut, mineral notes. The finish is long and laced with a touch of salt – a particularly refined take on Charmes that speaks to both site and vintage.

2023 Puligny-Montrachet, 1er Cru Les Chalumeaux, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2028-2040

Case 6 £475.00

Perched high and north on the Puligny slope, Chalumeaux sits right by the border of Meursault and Blagny, with stony soils and plenty of wind exposure. A fresh nose opens with citrus, spice, and crushed stone, while the palate is brisk and balanced, marrying fruit and acidity with elegance. The finish is long, subtly spicy, and quite poised – a Puligny that shines with character and finesse.

2023 Maranges, 1er Cru Fussière, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2026-2032

Case 6 £155.00

The nose is expressive, offering a bouquet of ripe red cherries and wild strawberries, interwoven with subtle notes of violet and a hint of earthy minerality. The palate is harmonious and balanced between vibrant fruit and refined structure. Flavours of red berry compote are complemented by nuances of liquorice and a touch of spice. The tannins are well-integrated, providing a silky texture that leads to a persistent, mineral-infused finish.



2023 Blagny Rouge, 1er Cru La Pièce Sous Le Bois, Domaine Matrot

Drink 2027-2039

Case 6 £250.00

Matrot's 2.5 hectares of Premier Cru Blagny La Pièce Sous Le Bois give a nose brimming with crunchy red berries, riper cherries, and a hint of floral lift. On the palate, it's supple and beautifully focused, showing impressive minerality on the finish. Proof that when in the right hands, Blagny can easily compete with the best Premier Crus from its neighbouring villages of Volnay and Chassagne.



DOMAINE GÉRARD THOMAS

Gérard's daughters, Anne, and Isabelle are the 4th generation leading this excellent domaine in Saint-Aubin. The wines have an upfront fruit and charm that makes them candidates for early accessibility and a steeliness and structure of ageing over the mid-term. Isabelle described 2023 as having more acidity and freshness than the more gourmand 2022 vintage. 20% new oak employed for all wines, and everything was bottled just before the harvest.

2023 Bourgogne Blanc, Domaine Gérard Thomas

Drink 2025-2030
Case 6 **£100.00**

A blend of plots from around Saint-Aubin and on the road to La Rochepot, this wine is bright and invigorating. Aromas of citrus and stone fruits are complemented by a subtle hint of white pepper. The palate is sleek and finely textured, with a pleasing chalky minerality. Balanced acidity adds freshness and precision to the finish, making it a versatile and refreshing white Burgundy.

Jean-Marc described 2023 as charming, with a little more richness than in 2022. He used less battonage across the range to preserve freshness.

The domaine was founded in 1985 following the marriage of Richard Fontaine to Laurence Gagnard. They inherited part of the Gagnard-Delagrangue estate, and Richard added some of his family vineyards. Today, the domaine is run by their daughter, Céline Fontaine, and Frédéric Robert. 2023 sees the expansion of their policy of extending the elevage for their 1er and Grand Crus, with La Grande Montagne and La Boudriotte now included.

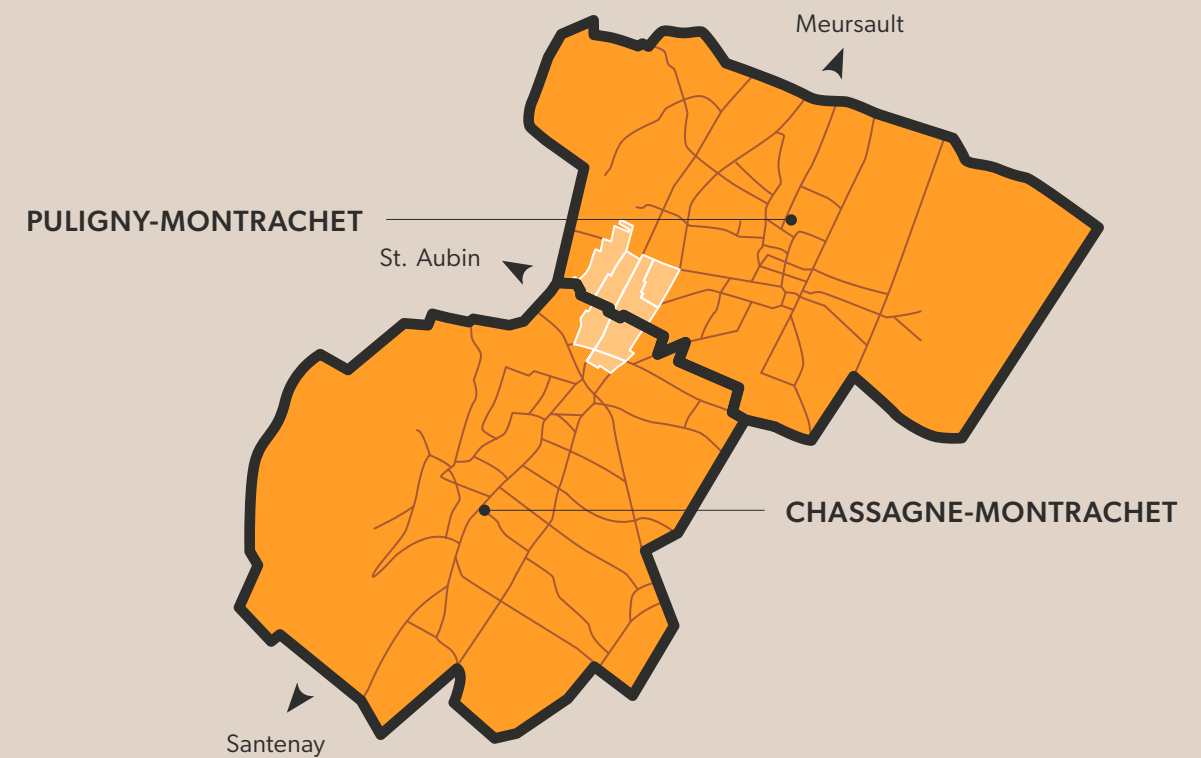

Patrick Javillier took over his father's tiny Meursault domaine in 1974. He gradually increased his holdings to ten hectares of 80% Chardonnay and 20% Pinot Noir. Patrick's daughter, Marion, is now in charge of making their red wines and the commercial aspects of the Domaine. Marion's brother-in-law, Pierre-Emmanuel, has worked alongside Patrick since 2011 and is now responsible for the white wines. Marion believes 2023 offers a good notion of terroir, and that the wines have an excellent balance between maturity and freshness.

DOMAINE ANTONIN GUYON

Domaine Antonin Guyon is one of the largest family-owned domaines in Burgundy, owning a remarkable 48 hectares of some of the finest vineyards across the Côte d'Or. The domaine is constantly striving to improve the vineyard and the cellar and has been certified organic since 2018. Hombeline Guyon believes that the wines in 2023 reveal excellent typicity of terroir.

2023 Meursault, 1er Cru Les Charmes Dessus, Domaine Antonin Guyon

Everything you would seek in a Corton-Charlemagne.



2023 Pernand-Vergelesse, 1er Cru Sous Frétilles, Domaine Antonin Guyon

This is another step up in quality from the 1er Crus and offers excellent value.

The nose is initially shy, but patience rewards with delicate notes of blackberry, damp forest floor, and a dusting of sweet spice that unfurl gracefully. The palate is taut, finely delineated, with integrated oak lending just the right amount of support to those silky tannins. This is a cerebral Charmes, a Grand Cru that wears its pedigree quietly yet confidently – one for the patient collector, as it promises to evolve with grace in the cellar.



DOMAINE SIMON BIZE

We tasted the 2023s with Eric Pignal, who is now making all the wines at the domaine. Chisa's son, Hugo, is increasingly involved. Eric previously worked at Dujac and Roulot, and Chisa believes his wines are gentler in style than the domaine previously produced. The domaine opted for strict de-budding to manage yield at the start of the season and didn't need to green harvest. Eric feels like the 2023s were more structured than 2022 initially but are now developing more finesse and definition with time in the barrel.

2023 Bourgogne Chardonnay, Domaine Simon Bize

Founded in 2005 by brothers Marc and Alex Bachelet, with support from their father and uncle Monnot, Domaine Bachelet-Monnot has quickly risen to prominence. We have been proud to work with Marc and Alex since the 2016 vintage. Marc is particularly excited about the 2023 vintage, describing the wines as showcasing “freshness, minerality, and balance.” This domaine has put Maranges on the map and is now firmly established as one of the shining stars of the Côte d’Or.

2023 Bourgogne Chardonnay Côte d’Or, Domaine Bachelet-Monnot

Domaine Darviot-Perrin was founded in 1989 by Didier Darviot and his wife, Geneviève, née Perrin, whose family brought many of the estate's prime vineyards. Since 2019, their son Pierre-Antonin has taken the helm, leaving a career in the foreign service to dedicate himself to the family domaine. Geneviève's father, Pierre Perrin, provided access to exceptional vineyards in the Côte de Beaune, many of which are planted with ancient vines that have been meticulously cared for. The estate has been farmed organically for 25 years and began its conversion to biodynamic viticulture in 2019. Pierre-Antonin is quickly building a reputation as one of the region's most exciting winemakers, crafting wines of exceptional quality with both Pinot Noir and Chardonnay, as well as Aligoté.

2023 Bourgogne Aligoté, Domaine Darviot-Perrin

Yet, it seems the domaine is reaching new heights, as Frédéric Lafarge and his children continue to produce some of the most captivating wines in the Côte d'Or. Reflecting on the 2023 vintage, Frédéric described it as “an easy season with a little rain when necessary, producing great quality and quantity.” These 2023s further cement the domaine’s status as one of Burgundy’s finest.

2023 Bourgogne Aligoté, Raisins Dorés, Domaine Michel Lafarge

This site is relatively warm and often among the first to be harvested. Hand-destemmed since 2016, the 2023 Château des Ducs is darker and more herbaceous than the Clos des Chênes, with a deep-rooted mineral quality. The tannins are finely cut but assertive, adding a sturdy frame to the wine's powerful, grounded profile. A brooding, contemplative Volnay Premier Cru with real depth and finesse.

Nicolas Potel continues to craft exceptional wines under Maison Roche de Bellène, drawing from some of the finest Premier and Grand Cru vineyards in Burgundy. Consistently achieving critical acclaim, these wines often rival or surpass the greatest names in the Côte d'Or. At Domaine de Bellène, Nicolas has been expanding his holdings of old-vine parcels, all cultivated biodynamically, to further enhance his estate's offerings. With an eye on sustainability, he has reduced the bottle weight for all the domaine wines. Reflecting on the 2023 vintage, Nicolas draws comparisons to the 1990 and 2005. It's the kind of vintage he would be happy to produce every year!

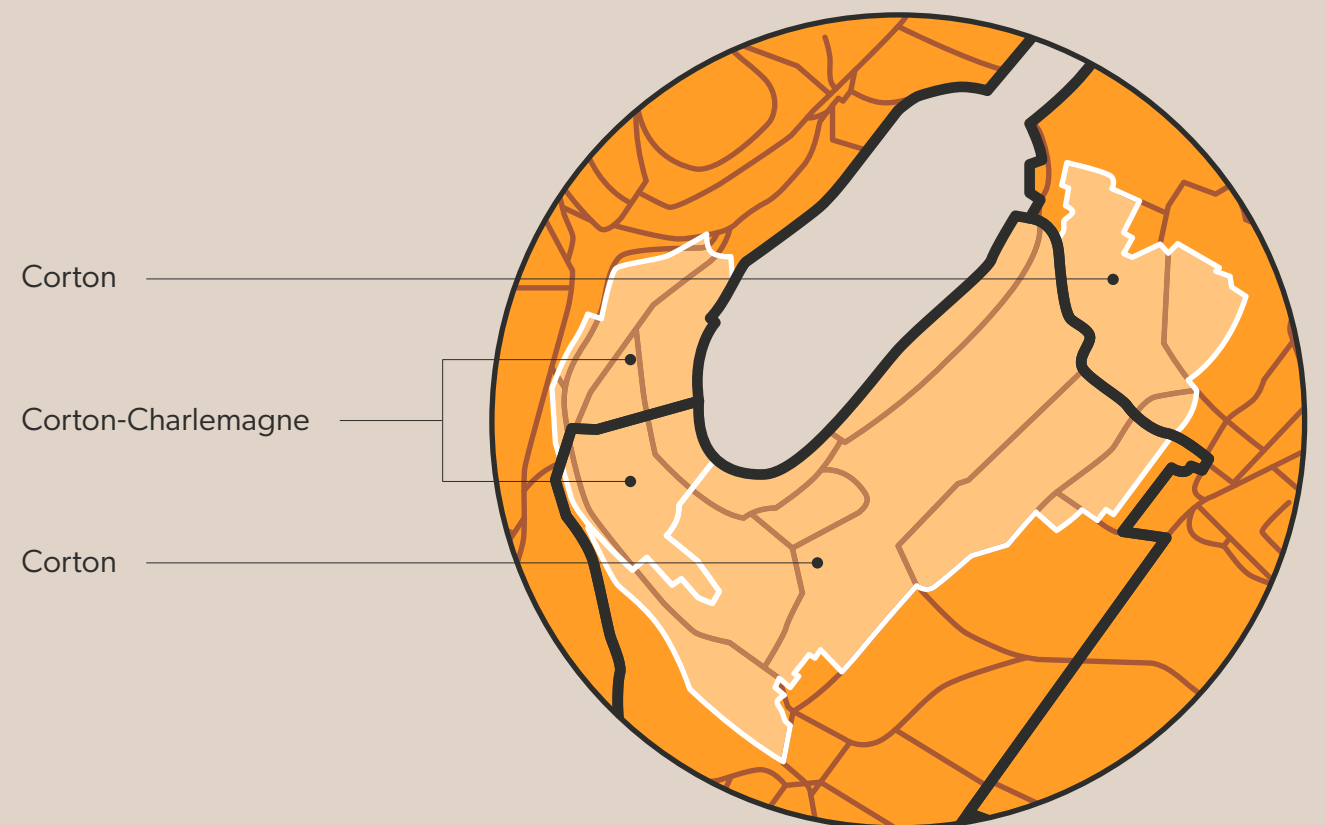
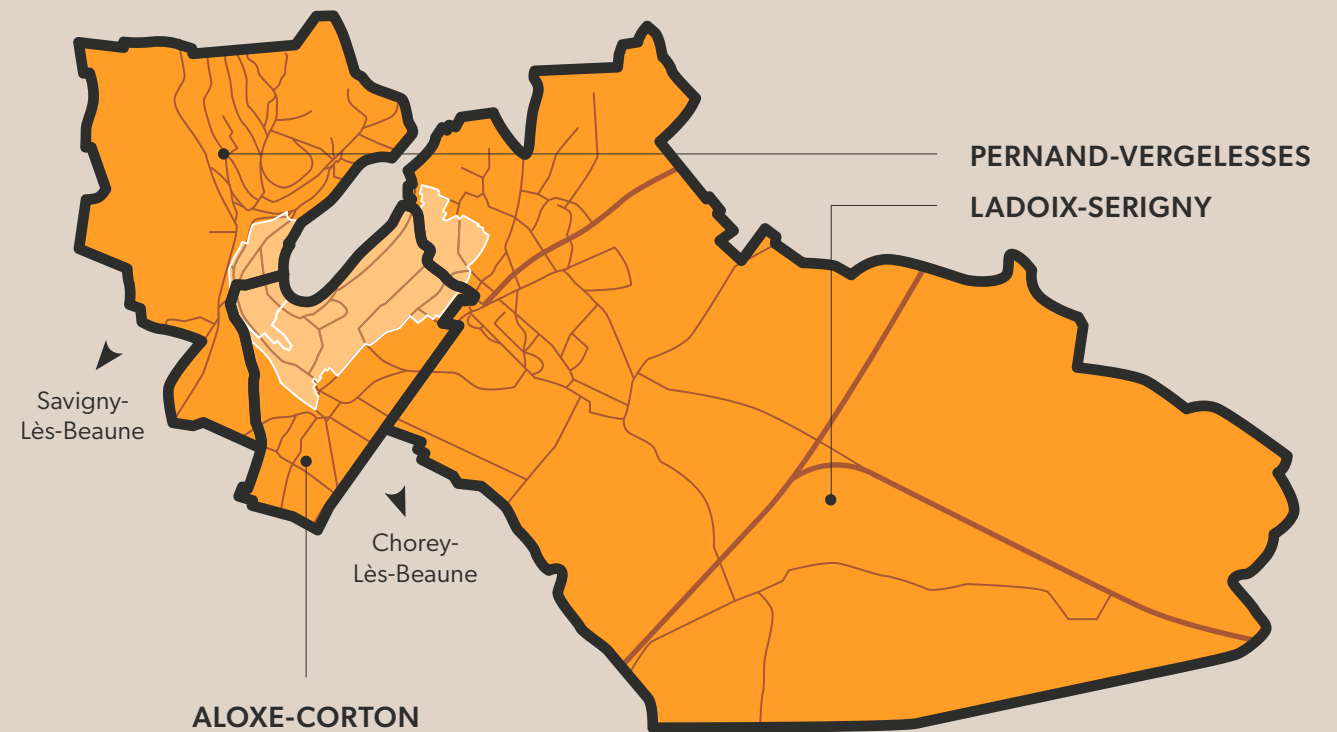

DOMAINE A.F. GROS

Now led by the 13th generation of this illustrious Burgundian family, Mathias and Caroline Gros bring fresh energy and innovation to Domaine A.F. Gros. Mathias continues to refine the estate's winemaking techniques, including the introduction of ceramic vessels for part of the vinification process starting with the 2023 vintage. We had the pleasure of tasting the 2023s with Caroline, who expressed satisfaction with both the quality and the generous volumes of this vintage. However, the outlook for 2024 is challenging, with the domaine facing a 70% reduction in production compared to 2023.

2023 Hautes Côtes de Nuits Blanc, Domaine A.F. Gros

This comes from the same plot above Nuits-Saint-Georges as the Hautes Côtes de Nuits red, but from a section from the bottom of the slope replanted from Pinot Noir to Chardonnay. A much smaller production than the Hautes-Côtes de Nuits Rouge. Fresh and brightly fruited, with an attractive whiff of flint adding complexity.

2023 Beaune 1er Cru Montrevenots Blanc, Domaine A.F. Gros

Beaune Premier Cru Montrevenots is above Le Clos des Mouches at the border with Pommard. It was historically a red wine terroir but has increasingly been replanted with Chardonnay in modern times. Fleshy and generous initially but steely and mineral on the finish.

2023 Hautes Côtes de Nuits, Rouge, Domaine A.F. Gros

From a high-altitude plot above Nuits-Saint-Georges, this 3.2-hectare vineyard of 50+-year-old vines offers a wine that emphasizes freshness and depth in 2023. The fruit shows notable density, giving the mid-palate a rounded quality that never overwhelms the wine's natural energy and balance. A wine that invites early enjoyment while beautifully capturing the bright, expressive nature of the vintage.

2023 Savigny-lès-Beaune, 1er Cru Clos des Guettes, Domaine A.F. Gros

From a 0.5-hectare plot, planted via selection massale in 1990, the year of Mathias' birth. This vineyard consistently produces small bunches of grapes. The Aux Réas lieu-dit is an extension of the Premier Cru Clos de Réas and invariably punches well above its village weight class. Floral, very much in the red fruit spectrum and sweetly spiced. Supple tannins and plenty of tension on the palate, this superior Vosne-Romanée has quietly developed a cult following amongst Jeroboams' customers.

The 2023 Clos Vougeot from Domaine Anne-Françoise Gros is a wine of impressive structure and refined strength. Dark cherry, blackberry, and subtle earthy undertones create a complex aromatic profile, while the palate shows remarkable depth and concentration. The tannins are firm yet polished, supporting the wine's weight without overpowering its elegance. The finish is expansive, with a quiet persistence that captures the wine's balance of intensity and finesse. This is a Clos Vougeot built for the long haul, embodying strength and sophistication in equal measure.

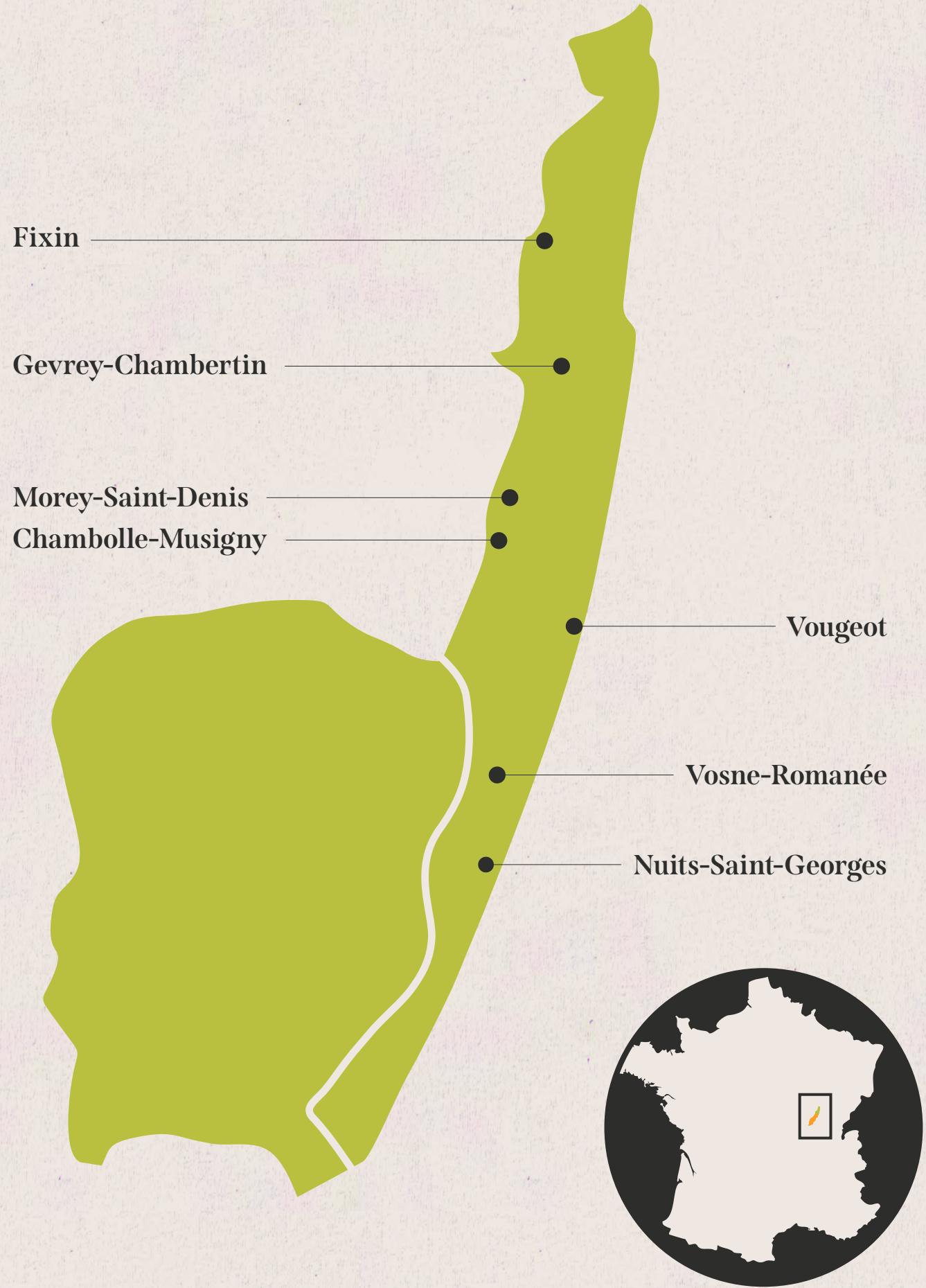

It opens with lifted aromatics before revealing a layered, mineral-driven core that coats the palate with fine precision. There's impressive structure here, yet it feels almost weightless, showing both power and grace. The finish fans out beautifully, broad and lingering, like a peacock's tail, leaving a lasting impression of pure class.

Aurélien Verdet's father was one of the pioneers of organic viticulture in the 1970s. Aurélien has run the domaine since his father's retirement in 2005. He has worked with David Duband, and you can feel some of that influence. Aurélien uses minimal sulphur and favours long vinifications with whole bunches, gentle extractions, and little new oak. The Hautes-Côtes is known for producing some of Burgundy's most exciting and affordable wines today. The Wine Advocate's William Kelley named Aurélien amongst the region's most promising emerging talents.

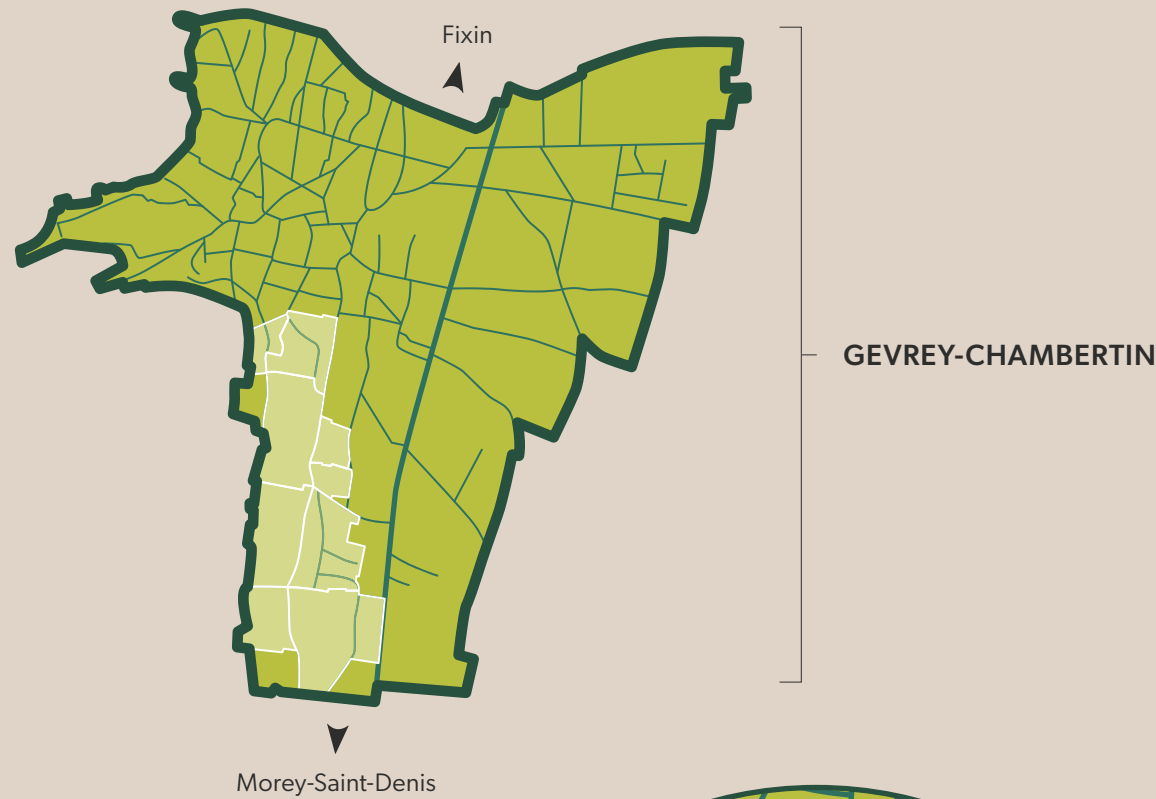

DOMAINE ODOUL-COQUARD

Sébastien Odoul’s talent was recognised early by his childhood friend Arnaud Mortet, and we’ve been thrilled to follow the domaine since the 2014 vintage. Sébastien honed his craft at esteemed domaines Dujac and Méo-Camuzet before joining his father at the family estate. His focus on old vines and smaller cuvées allows the individual terroirs to shine. The 2023 vintage marks another step forward for the domaine, with earlier picking, lower alcohols, and a greater emphasis on freshness. Sébastien described the wines as “delicate, with good acidity, tension and elegance.”

2023 Bourgogne Côte d'Or Pinot Noir, Domaine Odoul-Coquard

A blend of three plots, including a 70-year-old parcel from Les Presonniers near Gevrey-Chambertin, complemented by old-vine fruit from Chambolle-Musigny. The result is a beautifully expressive and juicy Bourgogne, filled with crunchy red fruit and a touch of earthiness, finishing with a refreshing sapidity that invites another sip. Layers of wild berry and black cherry wrapped in savoury spices, with lifted floral notes and a hint of saline on the finish. This is a true reflection of Morey-Saint-Denis – a wine of depth and vibrancy, capturing both the wilder edge and finesse of the terroir.

It's located underneath the Gevrey-Chambertin Grand Cru Mazoyères-Chambertin and Sébastien describes it as a Grand Cru of Morey-Saint-Denis. Sébastien's vines in Les Seuvrées are 70 years old, producing 13 barrels in 2023. One whiff of the glass and the decision to separate these vines is justified, revealing a disarming purity and intensity of red fruit and floral notes. The nose is bursting with wild strawberry, red cherry, and a hint of cranberry, layered with subtle notes of rose petal and sous-bois. On the palate, this wine delivers a focused core of bright, sappy fruit, balanced by a fine mineral thread and a gentle spice that adds depth without overpowering its freshness. 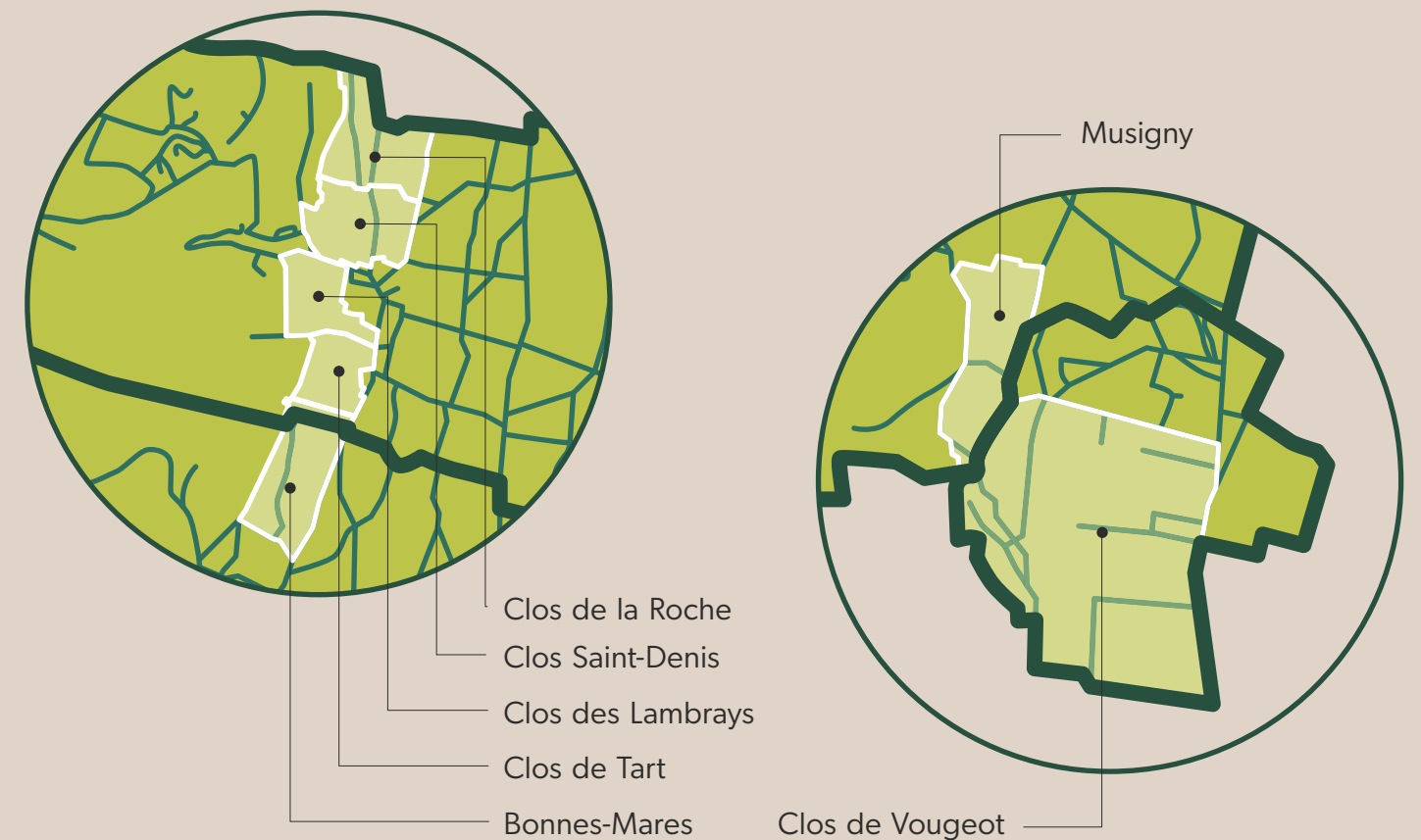
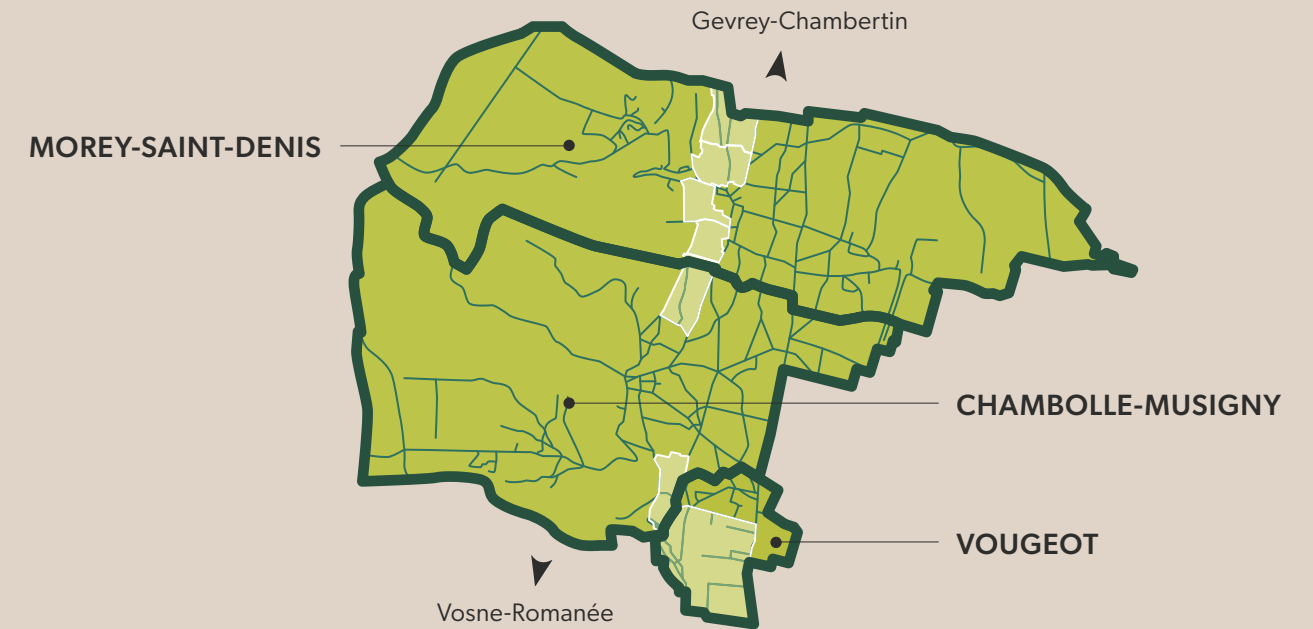

Today, all wines are labelled under the Marchand-Tawse name, with domaine wines distinguished by the "Vignes de la Famille Tawse" designation. This dynamic partnership continues to produce wines of exceptional quality and character.

The 65-year-old vines grow on a similar terroir to Clos de la Roche, with a shallow surface layer of clay over rocky limestone. The wine opens with floral aromatics, spiced plums, and a touch of orange zest. It is an elegant and refined expression of Morey-Saint-Denis, with depth and perfume that emphasise its exceptional terroir. The finish turns toward the wilder side of the village, with gamey, smoky tones adding complexity.

DOMAINE FAIVELEY

As one of Burgundy's largest vineyard owners, Domaine Faiveley oversees an impressive 125 hectares, including many of the Côte d'Or's most prestigious Premier and Grand Cru sites. These exceptional holdings have been carefully assembled since 1825 and are now stewarded by seventh generation Erwan Faiveley. The domaine is in the process of replanting parcels across several vineyards, which has temporarily lowered yields despite the naturally abundant harvest of 2023. This forward-thinking approach ensures the continued quality and longevity of their vines for generations to come.

2023 Puligny-Montrachet, 1er Cru Champ Gain, Domaine Faiveley ●

Acquired by Faiveley in 2008, this 1.05-hectare parcel is situated high on the slope, giving Champ Gain its characteristic delicacy. Founded in 1990 by Jacques Rossignol and his sons Nicolas and David, Domaine Rossignol-Trapet has steadily built a reputation for producing pure and refined wines. The brothers adopted biodynamic practices in the late 1990s, achieving certification in 2007. Today, they farm 11 hectares in Gevrey-Chambertin and two hectares in Beaune, crafting some of the most elegant and impressive wines in Gevrey. Recent vintages have seen an increased use of whole bunches, while new oak remains restrained, ensuring a focus on terroir expression. Nicolas Rossignol compares the 2023s to the 2017 vintage, praising their structure and approachability.

DOMAINE ROSSIGNOL-TRAPET

The remarkable vision of Philippe Drouhin's grandparents, who seized the opportunity to acquire Grand Cru parcels whenever available, has left Domaine Drouhin-Laroze with an enviable portfolio in the Côte de Nuits—40% of their vineyards are classified as Grand Cru. Assembling such holdings would be nearly impossible in Burgundy today. Caroline and Nicolas, the current generation, have built upon this legacy, refining their family's work, and securing the domaine's place among Gevrey's finest. Reflecting on the 2023 vintage, Nicolas remarked on the rare combination of quality and generous yields. He noted that full vats made the wines easier to vinify compared to years with smaller harvests.

2023 Gevrey-Chambertin, Dix Climats, ● Domaine Drouhin-Laroze

DOMAINE HENRI GOUGES

A pioneer of domaine bottling in the 1920s, Henri Gouges established a legacy that endures to this day. The domaine's 14.5 hectares, including 12 hectares of Premier Cru vineyards unchanged since the 1930s, are a cornerstone of the domaine and the village. While Gouges wines once had a reputation for needing decades to soften, the style has evolved significantly. The current wines honour their origins but are crafted with a lighter, more approachable touch. The 2023 vintage marks a bold step forward, showcasing wines that are among the most stylish and contemporary in the appellation, whilst staying true to the domaine's heritage.

2023 Nuits-St.-Georges Blanc, 1er Cru La Perrière, Domaine Henri Gouges

An 80-year-old gem, this 0.41-hectare plot sits high on the slope in the heart of Premier Cru La Perrière. The domaine was created in 1981 by Joël Hudelot, who combined vines from his father and his wife, Chantal Baillet. Joël retired in 2004 and passed along the reins to his son-in-law Dominique Leguen. Dominique was born in Brittany and had a career in the French Air Force before becoming a winemaker. He has quietly transformed the domaine, moving from big, powerful wines to Burgundies of elegance and finesse – precisely what we look for in Chambolle-Musigny. His son, Tanguy, works with his father at the domaine. Dominique believes 2023 has good maturity of fruit but still retains the essence of Chambolle-Musigny.

2023 Hautes Côtes de Nuits Blanc, Domaine Hudelot-Baillet ●

Bottled in November. Sourced from two parcels planted in 1997 and 1999, this is a beautifully fresh and inviting white Burgundy. The finish is spiked with hints of honey and fresh ginger, making for an appealing and harmonious wine.

DOMAINE JEAN-MARC MILLOT

Jean-Marc Millot started bottling his wines in 1992, but it wasn't until 1997 that he took control of other family vineyards to make the range we see today. Jean-Marc's daughter Alix is now at the helm, bringing increased precision and focus to the wines without losing their charm. Alix described 2023 as a juicy vintage, producing wines that are easy to drink and like 2017 in character but with an extra dimension.

2023 Côte de Nuits Villages, Aux Faulques, Domaine Jean-Marc Millot

DOMAINE BRUNO CLAVELIER

Bruno Clavier, a former rugby player turned vigneron, took over his family's vineyards in the 1980s, transforming the domaine into one of the region's most respected producers. With holdings in some of Burgundy's most prestigious appellations, including Vosne-Romanée, Chambolle-Musigny, and Gevrey-Chambertin, the domaine is renowned for its emphasis on terroir expression and meticulous organic viticulture. The old vines, many of which date back nearly a century, are cultivated without synthetic inputs, allowing the soils and microclimates to shine through in the wines. Clavier's approach in the cellar is equally restrained, using minimal intervention and subtle oak to craft wines that are pure, precise, and deeply reflective of their origins. Bruno compared 2023 to 1978 in terms of its generosity.

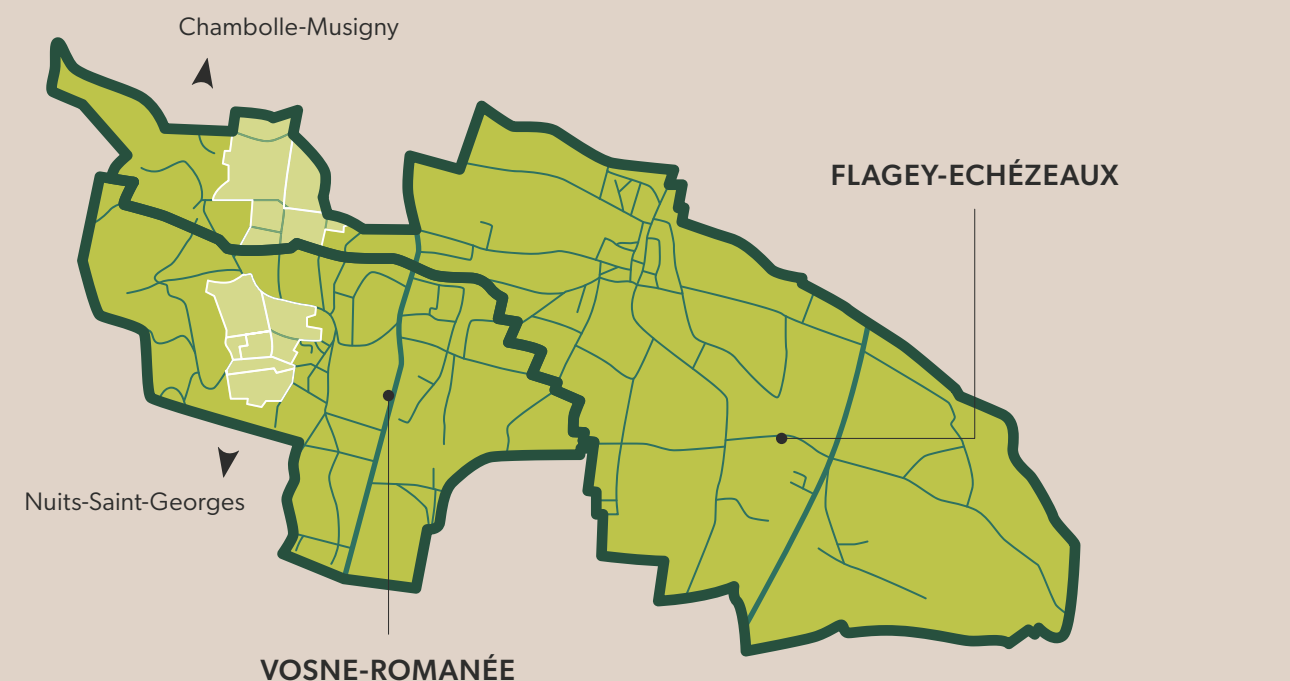

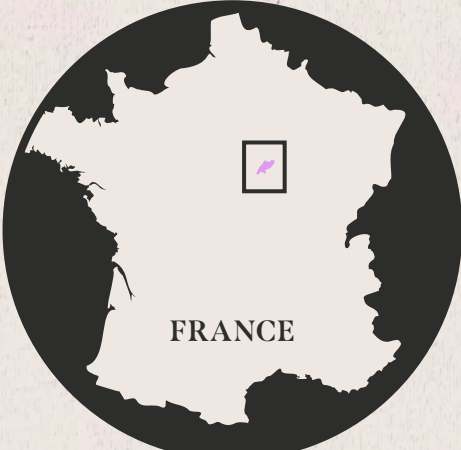
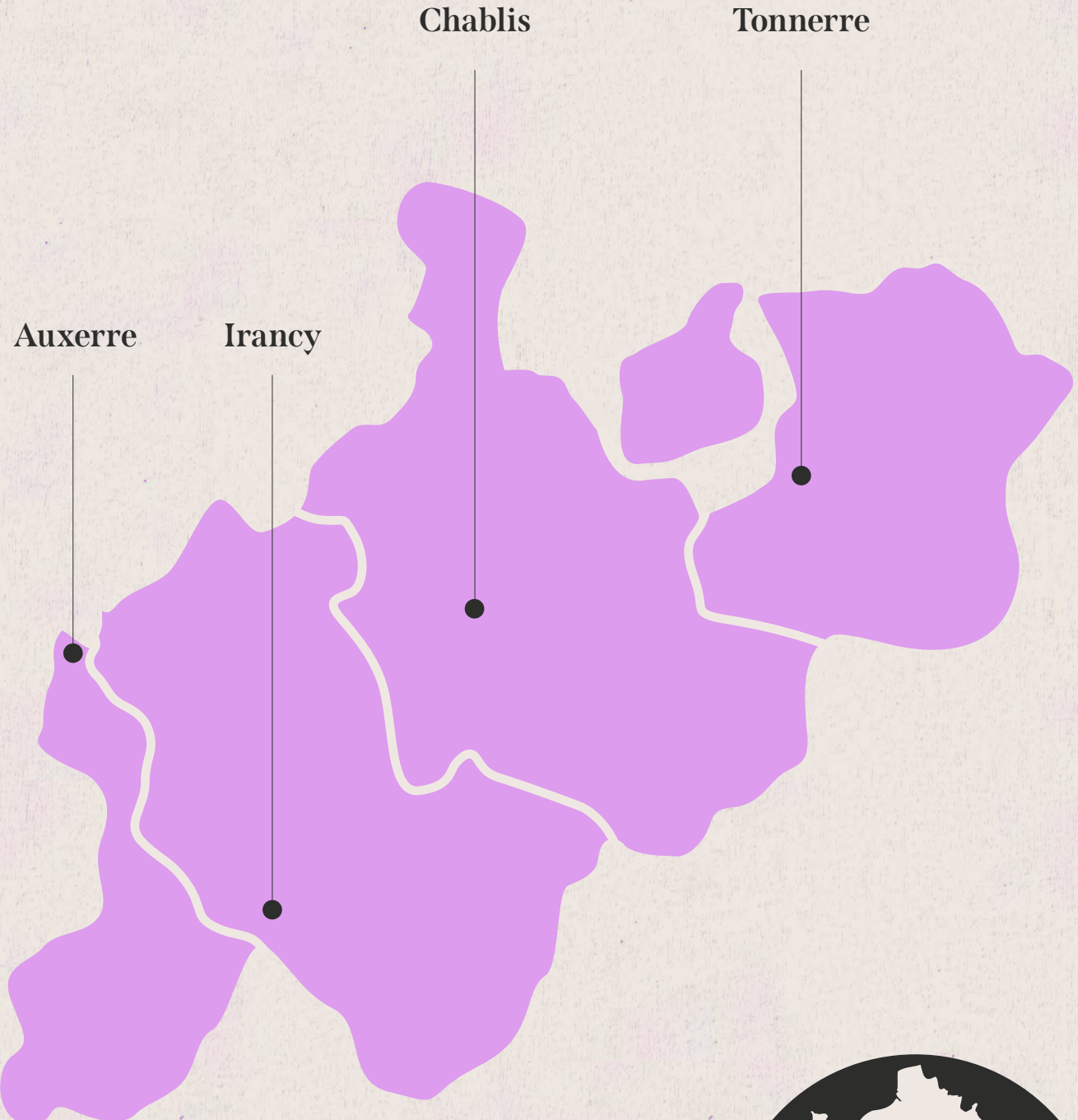

The Moreau family have been making wine in Chablis since 1814, with Louis founding his domaine in 1994. Organic since 2004, he owns parcels in four of Chablis' seven Grand Crus, including the Hospices monopole within Les Clos. Louis looks for clarity and expression of terroir from each site, and the wine is vinified 100% in steel tank to preserve the freshness and expression of the terroir.

2023 Chablis, 1er Cru Vaillons, Domaine Louis Moreau

A blend of three south-facing plots – Roncières, Les Lys, and Chatains – with vines averaging 50 years of age, rooted in classic Kimmeridgian soils. DOMAINE BILLAUD-SIMON

Since Faiveley purchased the domaine in 2014, winemaker Olivier Bailly has been working closely with Faiveley's Technical Director, Jérôme Flous. Slightly earlier picking and reduced percentages of new oak have led to more refined wines, which have never been better than today. Olivier described 2023 as a lovely vintage for both quality and quantity, remarking that the wines are fresher than expected and similar in quality to 2018.

Having made wine at Billaud-Simon for 20 vintages, Samuel Billaud set out on his own following the sale of the family domaine to Faiveley. Samuel's wines have reached new levels since completing his modern winery in the heart of Chablis. For our money, these are some of the most exciting wines made in Chablis today. Samuel was pleased with the quality of 2023 and believes that the resulting wines have excellent tension and acidity.

2023 Petit Chablis, Domaine Samuel Billaud

Samuel's Petit Chablis comes from a single vineyard located directly above Grand Cru Les Clos, where a mix of Kimmeridgian and Portlandian soils shape the wine. On the palate, it is crisp and mineral, with fresh acidity and a saline finish that carries a distinct spray of sea salt. Samuel notes that the vineyard's windy terroir contributes to the wine's vibrant freshness and concentration.

DOMAINE WILLIAM FÈVRE

The Fèvre estate totals 51 hectares, and with 16 hectares of Premier Cru and 15 hectares of Grand Cru, they are the largest owner of Premier and Grand Cru vineyards. Tasting their range, En Primeur is always a reference point for the region; these are beautiful expressions of their terroirs, classically styled and precise. Winemaker Didier Séguier is optimistic about the quality of 2023, noting that the wines have grown with each passing month of élevage.

A sub-climat of Vaillons bottled as a standalone cuvée since 1998. The two parcels of 65-year-old vines face north, a significant asset in warmer vintages. Steely, racy, and unmistakably Chablis, this is a connoisseur's choice among Premier Crus.

This is a wine that rewards patience, promising greater complexity with time in bottle.

Positioned at the southern edge of Fourchaume, Vaurent is the only Premier Cru that shares a direct geological continuation with the Grand Cru slopes. The palate offers remarkable depth and harmony, with a satiny texture that's both refined and full of latent power. A core of stony minerality drives the long, resonant finish.

Fèvre's largest Grand Cru holding, covering 6 hectares, of which 4 hectares are used for this cuvée. Full-bodied and textural, it shows orchard fruits dusted with spice, along with a subtle petrichor character. Lower acidity relative to its peers, but perfectly balanced. Approachable in youth, but with the structure to age gracefully.

From a steep, sun-drenched south-facing slope, Fèvre's 1.2 hectares are always among the first to be harvested. The wine walks the line between richness and freshness. This is a wine built to evolve in bottle, with Didier calling it "an excellent terroir for ageing."

Fèvre is the only estate with vines on both the south-west and south-east slopes of Preuses, offering a full-spectrum interpretation of this noble site. A saline steeliness runs through the finish, which lingers with remarkable persistence. It is a wine of grandeur and depth, with a rare fusion of power and poise.

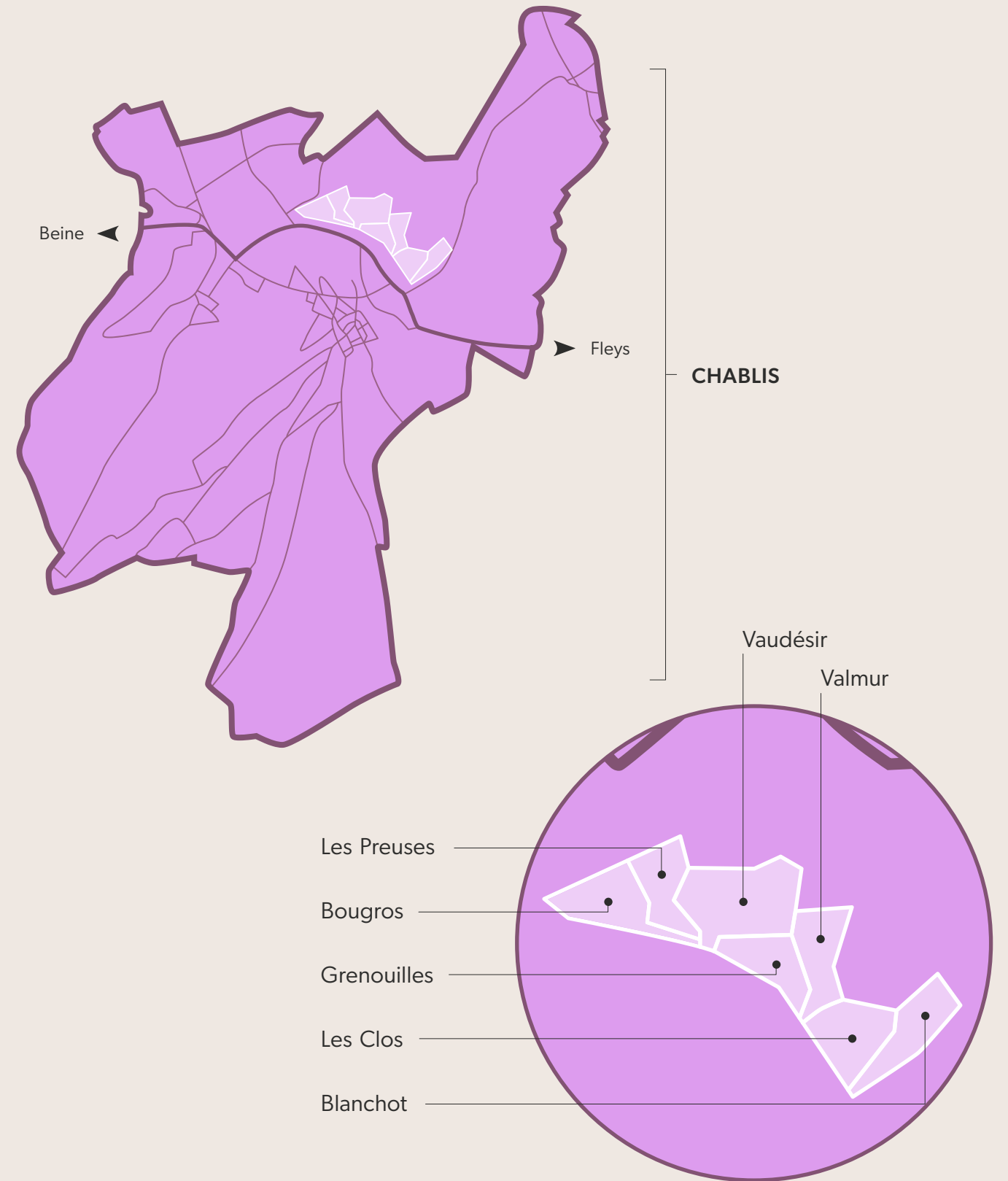
The steepest, rockiest section of Bougros, with Fèvre cultivating 2 hectares across two plots. Bottled separately since 1998, Côte Bouguerots is an uncompromisingly mineral wine. Slate and crushed oyster shells leap from the nose, while the palate is piercingly taut, laced with spice and almonds. The finish is profoundly saline, almost electric, with energy and grip that underscore the terroir's greatness.

The pinnacle of Fèvre's holdings, 4.11 hectares across eight plots on the cooler, upper slopes. Many vines date back to the 1940s, rooted in shallow soils rich in Kimmeridgian oyster shells. Tightly wound and fiercely saline, the latent power of this Les Clos is palpable. Notes of quince and honeysuckle offer subtle aromatic charm, but the focus is on structure and minerality. The palate is laser-sharp, linear, and brimming with tension, shrugging off the season's warmth with ease. The finish is monumental, resonating with oyster shell and marine salinity. A wine of profound depth and regal precision, destined for the long haul.

Le Maufoux

Le Maufoux is a contemporary bistro in Beaune by the team from Le Soufflot in Meursault, and they have opened a second location in Chablis. Both locations benefit from the excellent wine list at Le Soufflot. They are reliably open on Mondays when many other restaurants are closed.

La Dilettante

La Dilettante is a wine bar and bistro focusing on organic and natural wines from Burgundy and beyond. The primary wine selection lines the wall on the right of the restaurant, and there is also a blackboard with a changing selection of fine wine. The food is designed for sharing, with excellent charcuterie, and they make terrific Croque Monsieur and Croque Madame.

La Lune

La Lune is one of the hottest tickets in Beaune, and advance reservations are a must. It is a small restaurant with only around 15 covers serving Japanese and French cuisine. Sitting at the bar is the best option to watch the chef in action. The Karaage chicken is worth the trip alone.

Le Cellier Volnaysien

A traditional restaurant in a cellar with tables outside in the summer. I couldn't tell you what the rest of the menu is because I always have snails in garlic butter followed by coq au vin that tastes like my Grand-mère might have made had she been born in Volnay and not Wigan. The wine list has a strong Volnay focus and selections from around the Côte-d'Or.

Le Soleil

Le Soleil is a restaurant owned by Chisa Bize from Domaine Simon Bize, serving delicious contemporary French food inspired by Italian, Asian, and Moroccan cuisine. The service is charming and informal, with a terrific ambience. The wine list is extensive and features traditional and natural wines. You can find some rare releases from Domaine Simon Bize here.

1 Allée des Tilleuls, Savigny-lès-Beaune

Premnord

A restaurant from Domaine Prieuré-Roch on the Route des Grand Crus in Prémieux, on the way to Nuits-Saint-Georges. Fresh, seasonal food with a reasonably priced lunch menu and à la carte choices. The wine list is extensive, with a comprehensive range of wines from the domaine, Burgundy, and beyond.

6 D974 (Route Nationale 74), Prémieux-Prissey

Complexe Sportif de Gevrey-Chambertin

A unique spot for lunch, this is a sports centre, so there are people playing badminton, but they also serve really good burgers. There is always a well-priced menu du jour, and the wine list is surprisingly good because it is often filled with local winemakers who like to drink well!

Soul Kitchen

A cosy gem in Beaune, Soul Kitchen is the vision of Chef Patron Mathieu Guennal, who personally handles every aspect of the dining experience – from greeting guests and taking orders to cooking and even washing up! To ensure this hands-on approach, the restaurant offers two menus: a traditional Burgundy menu celebrating regional classics and a contemporary menu that changes weekly. A thoughtfully assembled, small wine list perfectly complements the dishes.
